Course Overview/Description

HISTORY 205. American History to 1865. 3 Credits.

This course explores early American and United States history through 1865, with attention to politics, society, economy, culture, and gender. Following an overview of Turtle Island (a Native designation for North America) before European contact, likely topics to be considered include the European colonization process; the creation and expansion of the United States; the evolution of formal and informal democratic institutions; Native resistance, accommodation, and persistence; the rise and fall of the institution of African slavery in the Atlantic world; early industrialization; and the causes and outcomes of the Civil War.

HISTORY 206. History of the United States from 1865 to the Present. 3 Credits.

This course explores the history of the United States since 1865, with attention to politics, society, economy, and culture. Likely topics to be considered include: the African-American freedom struggle during Reconstruction and the Jim Crow era; the conquest of the trans-Mississippi west; industrialization and labor conflict; immigration; the expansion of American military and economic power around the world, including participation in the First World War, the Second World War, and the global Cold War; the growth of state power; urbanization and suburbanization; feminism, women's rights, civil rights, and other social movements; and the rise of conservatism since the 1970s.

Course Learning Outcomes

Course Objectives:

- 1. Identify major themes, trends, and problems of US History from 1492-present.
- 2. Identify and evaluate the arguments historians make about major developments in US History from 1492-present.
- 3. Interpret primary source documents and use these interpretations to make a logically consistent argument about some of the major questions in US history from 1492-present.
- 4. Write an analytical essay that synthesizes primary and secondary sources to formulate a unique historical argument.

ESSENTIAL SKILLS AND GENERAL EDUCATION

In addition to evaluating your understanding of the big questions above, I will assess your ability to:

- 1. Think like a historian, with attention to context, multiple perspectives, and complex causation.
- 2. Read and interpret primary sources (documents from the time period being studied).
- 3. Explain and evaluate secondary sources—historians' interpretations and arguments.
- 4. Express and support historical arguments in public discussion and in writing.

This course fulfills the Humanities General Education requirement. The questions and skills above reflect the General Education objectives for the Humanities, which state that all graduates should be able to:

- 1. Describe the Humanities' unique ways of understanding major events and movements in Western and world civilizations by critically examining a range of literary, philosophical, and other cultural texts produced by those movements.
- 2. Articulate individual and social values within cultures and the implications of decisions made on the basis of those values.

How to be successful in this course

Written Assignments

- 1. <u>Concept Outlines</u>- To be completed to ensure the material has been learned and can be used to help review for chapter guizzes and unit exams. These are DUE THE DAY OF THE UNIT EXAM!
- 2. Long Essay Questions (LEQ)- In class, timed essays on a particular chapter or unit. 40 Min.
- 3. <u>Document Based Questions</u> (DBQ's)- 7 Documents are provided for you to interpret, analyze and organize. Will be written in class. 60 min.
- 4. <u>Short Answers Questions</u> (SAQ)- These usually require 3 parts centered on one specific topic. Must use proper nouns to earn credit. Will be completed in class. 12-15 min. (40 min. for 3 on Exam)
- 5. <u>Unit Exams</u>- Cover multiple chapters and call for higher level thinking skills to be applied. Test your understanding and NOT just what you can memorize. Mostly comprised of broad based questions calling for you to combine multiple readings to DRAW CONCLUSIONS AND MAKE INFERENCES!

Course Expectations

- 1. Read the assigned material in the study book and analyze the meaning of what you read
- 2. ANNOTATE YOUR STUDY BOOK AS YOU READ!
- 3. Come prepared to work each day and bring a positive attitude
- 4. Contribute to classroom discussions daily and offer new insights
- 5. Step outside your comfort zone to maximize your learning potential
- 6. Bring your chromebook charged to class, every day.
